### PREFACE

The entrenchment of Eastern and Western civilizations has inculcated in African peoples a form of generalized mistrust of their own endogenous values. This anchoring has had a fatal weapon: holy war. Yes, Jihad is not limited Islam. The other imported religions, to including, of course, Christianity and, to a lesser extent, Judaism, also waged a war of expansion, more insidious and latent certainly, but just as pernicious as that of the spear and the club, for it had an equally devastating impact: the monopolization of the spirit under the cover of the Word of God, a Word of God presented as pacifist, but which in the long run raided most of the socio-cultural tropisms of the black peoples.

Without entering into the fundamental debate on the original ethical value of religions, a debate reputed to have no outcome and which

generates unnecessary tensions, I will limit myself here to recalling one fact: the African, under the influence of the Judeo-Christian and Mohammedan civilizations, is today in a generalized denial. His food, his dress codes, his languages, his arts and all his identity determinants have become archaic, savage, even shameful for him.

But let us be reassured: this is only the manifestation of a collective hypocrisy, because in reality, the African loves his culture. He just doesn't have enough audacity or honesty to wear it with pride. He will look around him at the restaurant before ordering man tindjan and will prefer Beaufort to palm wine. However, as soon as he finds himself at home away from the extroverted looks of the man-white, he becomes himself again, because he doesn't really like chicken fries. And when he is asked why this addiction to ultramarine, he

will say with a slightly shameful smile: "Hum, how are we going to do it"?

The names he gives his children are not immune to this phenomenon of selfdisplacement. At the birth of his child, the African, while obviously chocobitating, will use Yann, Maelle, Ovidio, Larissa and other Moctar or Habib with Sèdiro, Gbènoukpo, Yémadiro, Sègla, Ablawa or Yèyimin or Roukiath as middle However, these African names. names, presented as secondary, he gave them with full knowledge of the facts, because he is aware that they correspond either to a day of the week, or to a fetal suffering, or to the reminder of a historical fact, or to a requirement of the Fa, that they are stuck to a precise context, and that they tell a story that the tradition most often connects to the personality of the child. He knows that he is at the bottom of a compulsive assimilation against a background of cowardice, but he defends himself with light

arguments such as freedom and other clichés of globalization.

Fortunately, among the Africans that we are, black skins and white masks as Frantz Fanon would say, there are increasingly dissonant and audacious voices, which are rushing into the perilous workings of promoting values that have risen from the depths of the ages. Among these voices, we can already mention that of Gnonnantin Noutais, who chose to explore the gigantic area of first names. Of course, drafts already existed on the Internet, with more or less questionable sources. My African first name, an intimate and claiming title, is like a real cobblestone in the immense ocean of onomastics. The author makes an inventory of hundreds of first names of African origin by matching their meaning in their original language, which sounds like a big kick in the anthill of acculturations.

By thus formalizing a lexical approach not yet to my knowledge - carried to the book stage in Benin, Gnonnantin Noutais is positioning himself as a pioneer of a form of appeal to renewal by emphasizing the most elementary and most important identity attribute: the designator.

I like to put the author on her guard: as long as young Beninese, virulent against France in their Facebook posts, are still the first to dream of being photographed in front of the Eiffel Tower, we will be far from the end of this collective neurosis of black people in the sense of Fanon, and a book on the valorization of African names may remain stuck in the internal contradictions of the people it is supposed to illuminate. On the other hand, if the political will, which starts with the family and then the school before reaching, like a malignant metastasis, the whole social fabric, uses it as the active peg of a concerted and patient

process of psychological transformation, it is to be hoped that one day, the decolonization of the spirits can be put in phase with a systematic recourse to African first names, this in order to try to launch the small children on the paths of authenticity, freed that they will be secular dogmatic imprisonments, and therefore, of this methodical misunderstanding of their culture, therefore of their soul.
